Transcript of wedding announcement in the Victoria, B.C. British Colonist dated Oct. 2, 1907.

Note: Mrs. Sarah Ward was married three times.

On Monday afternoon (Sept. 30, 1907), the home of Mrs. Sarah (McNaughton) Ward, 303 Langford Street, was the scene of a pretty wedding, when her daughter Mary Jane (Mamie) was married to Edward Godfrey Lendrum, an employee of the British Columbia Railway Company.

The ceremony was performed by Rev. A. E. Roberts, pastor of Victoria West Methodist church. Miss Imogene Cox and Miss Violet Semple were bridesmaids, with the bride, Åôs brother, Charles McNaughton and Robert Robertson were groomsmen.

The bride wore a white silk dress trimmed with pointed esprit, and the bridesmaids dresses were crepe de chine with lace trimmings. The house was very prettily decorated for the occasion and the ceremony was performed under a beautiful floral bell.

After receiving the congratulations of their friends the happy couple left for a trip to the Sound (Puget Sound). Among the wedding presents received were the following:

Transcription was done April 9, 2011. As of this transcription the house at 303 Langford Street still stands. It was refurbished in the early 2000.

Mamie and Edward lived in a house next door and their two sons, Charles and Richard, were born there.

Note: Sarah (McNaughton) Ward, maiden name was Sarah Oldershaw.
